RELEASE OF INFORMATION

Effective July 1, 2002, schools receiving federal funds under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act must provide to military recruiters, upon request, secondary students' names, addresses, and telephone numbers. If the custodial parents of a student would like GHS to withhold this information from the military, please make a **WRITTEN** request within ten days of the first day of the school year. With this request, GHS will also withhold pictures and other information from the media, school annual and other resources that enable student identification.

INSURANCE

Insurance is available to individual students through a policy made available by the Sumner County Board of Education. It is highly recommended that students participating in extracurricular activities purchase an individual plan. Insurance is not provided by Gallatin High School. A packet of information is made available to each student at the beginning of the school year or may be picked up from the guidance office at any time during the year.

GRADES/GPA/RANK

Grades will be reported officially to parents and students after each nine weeks of instruction. The nine week grading period will stand alone, and each marking period will be averaged as 40% of the final grade. Parents will be given progress reports at the mid-point of each nine week grading period. Final exams including end-of-course tests and Gateway exams count 20% of the final grade.

Academic Recognition/GPA for Students Entering High School SY 06-07 and Thereafter

Students will be eligible to graduate with academic recognition by achieving the following:

4 Tiers of Recognition	Cumulative GPA	Minimum Honors/AP Courses

This academic recognition plan includes *all* courses attempted by students for all 8 terms of the high school career. The GPA is based on a four-point scale with internal weighting only (3 points on the final numerical grade for an honors course and 5 points on the final numerical grade for an Advanced Placement course). Rank by number will be assigned only to valedictorian and salutatorian. Students other than valedictorian and salutatorian will be recognized only by the tier in which they fall (not by a specific number).

**REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION FOR STUDENTS ENTERING
SY 06-07 THRU SY 08-09**

As established by the Tennessee State Board of Education and with regard to local graduation requirements, a diploma will be awarded to students who:

1. earn the required credits or satisfactorily complete an individualized education program;
2. make passing scores as determined by the State of Tennessee on the Gateway examinations in Algebra I/Math, Biology I/Science, and English II/English Language Arts;
3. have satisfactory records of attendance and conduct for eight terms

Students will graduate with academic recognition if they:

1. complete either the university path diploma requirements or the technical path diploma requirements or satisfactorily complete an individualized educational program;
2. maintain at least a 3.5 overall average on a 4.0 scale
3. meet the state testing standards;
4. have satisfactory records of attendance and conduct for eight terms; and
5. meet such additional requirements as specified by our local Board.

The Certificate of Attendance will be awarded to students who have earned the required units of credit and who have satisfactory records of attendance and conduct for eight terms, but who have failed to meet graduation standards as outlined above.

The Special Education Diploma will be awarded to students who have satisfactorily completed an individualized education program, and who have satisfactory records of attendance and conduct for eight terms, but who have not met graduation standards as outlined above.

No student will be permitted to go through graduation ceremonies until all requirements for graduation have been satisfactorily completed.

It will be the responsibility of any student who completes requirements for graduation at the end of the summer term to notify the principal of his/her school who will requisition a diploma. These students are not eligible to participate in any graduation ceremony and/or activity.

COURSES OF STUDY

For students entering SY 06-07, SY 07-08, and SY 08-09, academic recognition is based upon *all* credits attempted.

EXAMS/EXEMPTION POLICY

Exams will be given in each class at the end of each term. Exams will count 20% of the final grade. Nine-week averages will count 40% each.

Students can be exempt from *final exams* using the following grade/attendance criteria:

<u>18 Week Course</u>	<u>9 Week Course</u>
“A” average with up to 3 absences	“A” average with up to 2 absences
“B” average with up to 2 absences	“B” average with up to 1 absence

Within the exemption policy, every three (3) tardies = 1 absence. Any time spent in ISS or on OSS will result in the loss of exemption privileges for that class for the semester. ***There are no exemptions from Gateway and end-of-course exams since they are state-mandated exams.*** The administration reserves the right to review any exemption to determine if extenuating circumstances exist which might alter this policy.

ATTENDANCE POLICY - SECONDARY SCHOOLS GRADES 9-12

Recognizing that absenteeism is a hindrance to education and that the progress of a student at school depends on the regularity of attendance, the Sumner County School Board has adopted the following rules and regulations for grades 9 through 12 based on the State Compulsory School Attendance Law. Any parent, guardian, or other person who has control of a child or children, and who shall violate the provisions of this law shall be guilty of a Class C misdemeanor. Each day's unlawful absence shall constitute a separate misdemeanor.

Students will be considered absent in a class if they miss more than one half of that class period. EXCUSED ABSENCES are those absences tolerated by the school system under the law because the cause and benefits of the absence to the student as verified by proof outweigh the

benefits, which would have been achieved by attending school. For absences of a full or part day to be considered excused, a written note from the parent, guardian, or a doctor must be provided. After an accumulation of FIVE days of excused absences, the parent/guardian must file more formal documentation with the principal to assure classification as an excused absence, i.e., note from doctor, court, etc.

Adequate reasons for absences include the following:

1. Student's personal illness, medical appointment, or hospitalization verified by a licensed physician, dentist or health agency. If the illness or hospitalization is to exceed ten consecutive days, the parent or guardian should apply for homebound instruction through the Central Office (451-5200) after the first five days of consecutive absences.
2. Death of a family member. Death of a non-family person if approved by the principal.
3. Special recognized religious holidays regularly observed by a particular faith. A parent note must be submitted to the school principal prior to the student being absent for a religious holiday.
4. Required court appearances. Verification of court appearance times from appropriate authorities must be provided.
5. Approved school related activities. Prior approval is required.
6. Vacations/Trips with prior approval by the principal. A note from the parent/guardian shall be submitted prior to any vacation or trip. Principal approval is required. Vacations/Trips taken without prior approval will be considered unexcused.
7. Other extenuating circumstances beyond the control of the student. For such absences to be excused, they must be approved by the building principal or his/her designee.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCES are those which are not verified or which do not meet valid reasons for absences. All out-of-school suspensions are unexcused.

All missed class work or tests, whether excused or unexcused, may be made up provided the student makes a request to the teacher within 24 hours upon returning to school. The work must be returned to the teacher within three school days of the request. Students who have unexcused absences will receive a zero for such makeup work though they will be encouraged to complete the work in order to keep up in the class.

In order to meet the requirements for satisfactory attendance, a student may not miss more than FIVE days per semester. Unless an attendance hearing is requested by the parent/guardian, all absences in excess of five days in each semester (**EXCUSED OR UNEXCUSED**) will result in a loss of credit in each class in which five absences have occurred. (Suspension days will not count against the five absences.) With the sixth absence, a student's credits will be withheld until an attendance hearing takes place to determine if absences are due to extenuating circumstances. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian or student to contact the school a minimum of two weeks before the end of the term to request a hearing with the attendance committee. The local school committee has the authority to reinstate credit if the committee finds that the attendance requirements have been met or where extenuating circumstances exist. Parents/Guardians of students who disagree with the decision of this committee may appeal to the Sumner County Attendance Review Board appointed by the Director of Schools. Disagreement with the Review Board's decision may be taken to the full Board of Education. **ALTHOUGH CREDIT MAY BE WITHHELD, THE STUDENT MUST CONTINUE TO ATTEND ALL CLASSES TO COMPLY WITH THE TENNESSEE COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE LAW.**

RETURNING FROM AN ABSENCE

Students are required to bring a note signed by a parent/guardian upon arriving at school after an absence or after having left school early. After 48 hours of returning to school if a note has not been turned in to the office, the absence is considered unexcused. Notes must be handwritten and signed by a parent/guardian. E-mailed notes will *not* be accepted. All notes are to be turned into the main office.

SCHOOL HOURS

Students should not arrive at school prior to 7:30 a.m. and should exit the building by 3:30 p.m. unless under direct supervision by school staff. If after 3:30 p.m. and unsupervised, students are to report to room 118 and wait for their ride. Teacher hours are 8:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

DAILY PROCEDURE FOR THE ARRIVAL TO SCHOOL

Students are to report to the main gym as soon as they arrive at school (car riders/drivers should not sit in their vehicles). So that proper supervision can be provided, students are to remain in the gym until dismissed at 7:50. *After arriving on campus*, students are not to leave without permission from the administration and appropriately signing out.

TARDINESS TO SCHOOL / CLASS

To avoid interruptions in instruction and to maximize the learning process it is imperative that students make every effort to arrive at school on time. In the event a student arrives late to school, he/she MUST conform to the following:

- Students reporting to school after 8:15 A.M. are to report to the attendance office window and sign in before being admitted to class.
- Being tardy **three** (3) times in any one class period will result in one hour of detention (2 sessions). Each consecutive tardy for the **sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth** times in any class period will result in a full day of ISS. Being tardy to class for **ten** (10) times and beyond will result in disciplinary action extending beyond ISS, including OSS.
- The Administration reserves the right to perform random hall sweeps at the beginning of each block throughout the school day. (Any student who is not in the classroom is subject to disciplinary action, including ISS.)

RELEASE OF STUDENTS DURING SCHOOL HOURS

During the school day, ALL students are expected to remain in the school building from the time they arrive on school grounds until the end of school in the afternoon. Students are not permitted to leave campus during the school day unless they have obtained permission from their parents/guardians and approval from a school administrator. Requests should not be made for early dismissal unless they are absolutely necessary. All requests should be made in writing, signed and dated by the parent/guardian with a phone number where they can be reached. **Notes must be submitted to the Attendance Window before 8:10 a.m.** The request will then be verified by phone before a dismissal slip will be granted. Once a student has obtained a dismissal slip, he/she must sign out in the office at the designated time of dismissal. Students found guilty of forging parent's or guardian's signatures will be subject to disciplinary action.

***PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURES/RULES CONCERNING
CHECK-IN AND CHECK-OUT:***

- Any student leaving school without getting permission from the attendance clerk AND signing out properly will be considered skipping.
- Students who frequently check out during 4th block without a verified excuse will receive the following: on the 3rd time = two sessions of Detention; on the 6th time = 1 day of ISS; and on the 9th occurrence and each subsequent time = 2 days ISS.
- If a student returns to school after having checked out, he/she must sign in.
- STUDENTS ARE NOT TO CHECK OUT IN ORDER TO LEAVE CAMPUS FOR LUNCH.
- NO LUNCHES ARE TO BE DELIVERED TO THE SCHOOL.

VISITORS' POLICY

Any person visiting Gallatin High School must report to the school office and obtain visitor ID. The person must have a legitimate and well-defined reason for the visit. Visiting girlfriends or boyfriends or loitering in the building is not allowed. Visitors will not be permitted to attend classes with students. *Under the provisions of the visitor's policy, students are not permitted to bring children to school.* Delivery of food from outside restaurants, flowers, and other gifts is prohibited.

DRIVER'S LICENSE CERTIFICATION PROCEDURES

Driver's licenses and/or instructor permits for the operation of a motor vehicle for any person under the age of eighteen will be denied unless the student has written certification from school officials. The certification may be obtained from the attendance clerk (Ms. Baker) during normal school hours by students who meet the compulsory school attendance policy and make a passing grade in at least three (3) classes at the conclusion of the most recent term. Certification forms must be shown to the DEPARTMENT OF SAFETY EXAMINER before a student can take the drivers exam. *A certificate of withdrawal of a student's driving permit will be sent to the Department of Safety whenever he/she has excessive unexcused absences and/or failing grades.*

RESPECT FOR THE RIGHTS OF OTHERS

Every right you have has attached to it an obligation. Your rights must be balanced against the rights of others and their rights must be balanced against yours. That is why our society has laws and why a school has rules. If you are one of those students who wants to take full advantage of your rights and opportunities at this school, while at the same time respecting the rights of others, we at Gallatin High School will support and help you.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR YOUR OWN ACTIONS

You will be held responsible for only the things YOU do or fail to do. What others do or do not do is of little importance in determining whether or not you have accepted your responsibility as a student/citizen of Gallatin High School. Your first responsibility is to decide how you should conduct yourself while you are at school. Your second responsibility is to be prepared to accept the privileges and consequences of your actions.

CHARACTER EDUCATION

Students are expected to demonstrate high values and character while attending Gallatin High School. Theft, cheating, lying, forgery, plagiarism, etc. will not be tolerated. Appropriate disciplinary action will be taken for these violations.

LOCKERS

Students are assigned a locker and are expected to use this same locker throughout the school year. *Students should never place valuables in an unlocked locker.*

MEDICINE

ALL medicines (prescription and non-prescription) must be in original containers and kept in a designated area. All students must have prescription and non-prescription forms completed before the school can administer medication to the student. Please see the Sumner County Schools "Guidelines for Dispensing Medications" form for further information.

TELEPHONE USE

The school telephones are for business purposes only. Callers are requested to leave a message, since students will not be taken from classes for a routine call. Only emergency calls will be delivered during a class block. With permission, students may use their administrators' office phone for appropriate purposes.

STUDENT RELATIONSHIPS

Our school adheres to a "HANDS OFF" policy between any students. When this policy is violated, administrative disciplinary action will be taken. The parents may be required to come to school for a conference concerning the problem.

DETENTION

So that teachers will be able to handle routine disciplinary problems, detentions may be issued. Detention meets Monday through Friday from 7:00 to 8:00 and 3:30 to 4:30 in room 118 (**1 session of detention is 30 minutes**). Students may enter at 7:00, 7:30; 3:30, or 4:00. Note, detention will not meet on Friday afternoon. *In lieu of detention, teachers may issue Dirty Duty (cleaning of classroom, desks, boards, etc.).*

FAILURE TO SERVE

Students who do not serve assigned detention(s) are subject to disciplinary action by the administration. The following procedure will be used for students who do not serve: **1st offense** (1 full day of ISS), **2nd offense** (2 full days of ISS), **3rd offense and each consecutive offense** (1 full day of OSS). Note, one session of detention is considered 30 minutes.

STUDENT ID'S

Everyone, students and staff, will be required to wear a school issued ID card. **IDs are to be worn at all times within the school day.** Lanyards will be provided so that the ID can be worn around the neck. Any student found not wearing his/her school issued ID is subject to punishment deemed appropriate by his/her principal. A student who wears someone else's ID or a false ID is subject to a full day of ISS. "Not Wearing Your ID" **three (3) times** in any one class period will result in one hour of detention (2 sessions). Each consecutive "Not Wearing Your

ID” for the **sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth** times in any class period will result in a full day of ISS. “Not Wearing Your ID” for **ten** (10) times and beyond will result in disciplinary action extending beyond ISS, including OSS.

Replacement ID’s and lanyards may be obtained in the Library at a cost of \$3.00 each.

SKIPPING CLASS/SCHOOL

A student is considered *skipping class* when he/she is not in the classroom to which he/she has been assigned by a teacher, staff member, or administrator. A student is considered *skipping school* when he/she has left campus or never reported to campus. A student who skips a class(es) will be given **1 full day** of ISS on the **1st offense** (2 full days if the offense includes leaving/off campus), **2 days** of ISS on the **2nd offense**, and **3 days** of ISS on each of the **3rd, 4th, & 5th offenses**. Further infractions within the year could lead to the administration requesting a disciplinary hearing.

OFF LIMITS AREAS

Students are not to be outside the building, or in the parking lots without permission. Students are to remain in the cafeteria during lunch. Students should remain in the assigned areas at all times. Students will be given **1 hour** (2 sessions) of detention on the **1st offense**, 1 day of ISS on the **2nd offense** and **2 days** of ISS on each of the **3rd and subsequent offenses**.

HALL PASSES

Any student leaving the classroom for any reason is required to have a hall pass. The hall pass must be visible at all times. A student found in violation of this policy is subject to appropriate disciplinary action by his/her administrator.

RESTROOMS

Students are asked to help keep restrooms clean, safe, graffiti free, and smoke-free. Only one person at a time is allowed in a stall. Restrooms generally should not be used when classes are in session. **When an emergency arises that necessitates a student leaving class, a hall pass is required.**

BREAK

Break is to serve as a time of leisure for our teachers and students. Horseplay or loud behavior will not be tolerated. There are two (2) 7 minute breaks during the school day. They are between 1st and 2nd block classes and then between 3rd and 4th block classes. The labs and the Juliette Doyle Guthrie Theatre will be closed during break. However, halls, lobbies, and the library will remain open. Going to the parking lot during break without permission from an administrator will result in 1 hour (2 sessions) of detention.

DRESS AND GROOMING

Students dressed inappropriately on school property will have to change into appropriate clothing and will not be allowed to return to class until they have made the clothing change. *If a student is unable to change to approved clothing, he/she will be assigned to ISS and/or a parent conference.* If a student continues to violate the dress code, disciplinary action will move beyond ISS, including OSS. When, in the opinion of the administration and staff, a student is

not dressed appropriately or exhibits grooming which is considered detrimental to the educational environment, appropriate action shall be taken.

THE FOLLOWING SHALL NOT BE WORN TO SCHOOL:

- ~ Extreme hair styles/color/make-up
- ~ Form fitting/body conforming clothes or revealing necklines
- ~ House shoes or pajama-like attire
- ~ Bare midriff, halters, fishnet, or tank tops
- ~ Clothing or articles related to gangs
- ~ Suggestive slogans, vulgar captions, pictures of advertisements for tobacco, alcohol, drugs, or sex
- ~ Holes in pants or torn clothing (cannot be covered with tape)
- ~ Eyebrow, nose, lip, or tongue piercings (ear piercing only)
- ~ Saggy/sagging pants
- ~ Spandex
- ~ Hats/Caps
- ~ Head dress for boys or girls
- ~ Bandanas
- ~ Roller shoes
- ~ Trench coats
- ~ Grills
- ~ Cleated shoes
- ~ Wallet Chains

IN ADDITION, THESE GUIDELINES SHALL BE FOLLOWED:

- ~ Pants should not drag the floor, be appropriately sized, and should be worn at the hips or above
- ~ Muscle shirts or sleeveless shirts are not to be worn to school
- ~ Boys: shirt tails must be tucked in and a belt worn at all times.
- ~ Shorts must have a 5-inch inseam and not be higher than 3 inches from the bend of the knee; shorts may be worn until October 30 and may be worn again beginning April 19 (after Spring Break); **NO** Gym Shorts
- ~ Hats are not to be seen/carried during school hours
- ~ Hair picks/combs are not to be worn in hair
- ~ **NO** Cotton Sweatpants
- ~ Skirt length or slits in skirts must not be higher than 3 inches from the bend of the back of the knee; Leggings can be worn with standard length dress or skirt
- ~ No lettering across the seat of garments
- ~ Chests, shoulders, backs, and midriffs should be covered at all times
- ~ Shoulders must be covered by a 2-inch or more shoulder seam
- ~ No tinted glasses/sunglasses unless doctor prescribed
- ~ No inappropriate head coverings such as bandanas, sweatbands, do-rags, or hairnets
- ~ Jewelry must not be distracting/disruptive or unsafe
- ~ Valuable clothes and jewelry are discouraged
- ~ No body piercing jewelry except for earrings may be worn during school hours
- ~ Tattoos that display drugs, sex, alcohol, or tobacco products must be covered at all times
- ~ No blankets may be worn during school hours
- ~ Skateboards are NOT to be ridden on campus and must be kept in student lockers

CONDUCT ON BUSES

Transportation to and from school on buses operated by the county is a privilege. It requires that students conduct themselves properly, always obeying the instructions of the bus driver. "A student shall become ineligible for pupil transportation when his/her behavior is such as to cause dissension on the bus, or when he/she disobeys state or local rules and regulations pertaining to pupil transportation." *A student who needs permission to ride the bus with another student must turn in a note from a parent with a valid phone number to the main office prior to the start of 2nd block class.*

AUTOMOBILES / PARKING LOT

Students are not to loiter or linger in their automobile after they arrive on campus. ***If books or other personal items must be secured from a student's car, permission must be obtained from an administrator.***

The designated zone in front of the building is to be left open for emergency situations. The parking area in the back of the building has been reserved for teachers and for school buses. All cars must have a parking hand tag to legally park on campus. The cost to purchase a hang tag is \$6.00. A student violating the above rules, driving in a reckless manner, or causing an accident may have his or her driving privileges revoked.

Leaving campus in an automobile without permission from an administrator and signing out will result in 2 days of ISS for the **first offense**; the **second offense** will result in the loss of driving privileges for the remainder of the term in addition to additional ISS/OSS.

TECHNOLOGY / ELECTRONIC DEVICES AND OTHER ITEMS

Since use or possession of beepers on school grounds is against the law, students in violation may be turned over to Juvenile Court for each offense. ***Beepers, CD players, radios, playing cards, dice, and hacky sacks*** are not to be brought to school. If these items are brought to school, they will be taken up, tagged, and placed in safe keeping until the end of the current term.

Students who are in possession of beepers will be immediately, referred to the School Resource Officer (SRO). In addition, violations may result in suspension. Students must obtain permission from an administrator to use a ***camera or video.***

IPODs and MP3 players (without headphones) or other storage devices are allowed to be brought to school and used for educational purposes only. Students using these storage devices for non-educational purposes will have their device taken up, tagged, and placed in safe keeping until the end of the term.

IPOD Touch or any device capable of connecting to the Internet must be registered with the library in order to be brought to school. Violation of this policy will result in the device being taken up and stored in the safe. A parent/guardian must pick up the item. Any other offense will result in that student losing the privilege to bring such items to school. ***If caught texting, the device will be held for rest of the semester and the student will lose Internet privileges for rest of the School Year.***

CELLPHONES

In accordance with school board policy, students are prohibited from using or having cell phones on their person during the school day. This includes before, during, and after school. Cell phones may be placed in vehicles or other secure locations as determined by the principal.

1st Offense: Phone will be turned in to the student's administrator and must be picked up by a parent or guardian excluding the 3rd block time. ***2nd Offense:*** Phones will be kept in a safe place. Parent or guardian may pick the phone up at the end of the current term. ***3rd and***

Subsequent Offenses: 3 days ISS and safe keeping of phone until the end of the school year.

A student caught using another student's phone will be assigned 1 hour of detention (2sessions), and parent or guardian of the owner of the phone must come pick phone up. Student to whom the phone belongs to will also be in violation of the cell phone policy.

After violating this policy, a student who refuses to turn over his/her cell phone will receive either in-school (ISS) or out-of-school suspension (OSS).

SUSPENSION OF STUDENTS
(TCA 49-6-3401 / Tennessee State Law)

Any principal or principal-teacher of any public school in this state is authorized to suspend a pupil from attendance at such school, including its sponsored activities, or from riding a school bus, for good and sufficient reasons. Good and sufficient reasons for such suspension may include, but shall not be limited to:

1. Willful and persistent violation of the rules of the school or truancy
2. Immoral or disreputable conduct or vulgar/profane language
3. Violence or threatened violence against the person or any personnel attending or assigned to any public school
4. Willful or malicious damage to real or personal property of the school, or the property of any person attending or assigned to said school
5. Inciting, advising, or counseling of others to engage in any of the acts hereinbefore enumerated
6. Marking, defacing or destroying school property
7. Possession of a pistol, gun, or firearm on school property
8. Possession of a knife, etc. as defined in TCA 39-6-1701
9. Assaulting a principal or teacher with vulgar, obscene, or threatening language
10. Unlawful use or possession of barbitol or legend drugs, as defined in TCA 53-10-101.
11. Any other action prejudicial to good order of discipline in any public school.
12. Off-campus criminal behavior which results in the student being legally charged with a felony and the student's continued presence in school poses a danger to persons or property or disrupts the educational process.

Any principal/principal teacher of any public school in this state is authorized to suspend a pupil from attendance at a specific class, classes, or school-sponsored activity without suspending such pupil from attendance at school pursuant to an **in-school suspension** policy adopted by the local Board of Education. Good and sufficient reasons for such suspension may include, but shall not be limited to:

- A. Behavior which adversely affects the safety and well-being of other students
- B. Behavior which disrupts a class or school sponsored activity;
- C. Behavior prejudicial to good order and discipline occurring in class, during school-sponsored activities or on the school campus.

GALLATIN HIGH SCHOOL FIGHTING POLICY

Gallatin High School believes that harmonious relations can be developed among all students. GHS promotes positive ways of handling disagreements with other students. These positive ways include talking out the problem with the other student(s), a counselor, an administrator, a teacher, or a parent.

Students who choose to resort to violence to solve problems with other students will be dealt with in a severe manner. The school will not tolerate fighting. The danger to the students involved and to other students is too great to permit this type of behavior. Consequences for fighting range from 3 – 10 days OSS. The following procedures will be followed if students are cooperative with the school administration:

1. If deemed necessary, the police will be involved.
2. Students involved will have the opportunity to explain what happened.
3. The student who is deemed the principal cause of the fight will be punished.

4. The student who is deemed the lesser cause will be punished in proportion to his/her involvement in the fight. Students are expected to walk away and/or seek help when possible.
5. In the event that a student is involved in another fight at GHS, the student will be suspended and his/her parents will be requested to come to school for a conference with a school administrator.
6. Students involved in large numbers of verbal, physical, or written conflicts will not be tolerated at Gallatin High School. Upon a **10** day suspension, the student will be referred to the Sumner County Disciplinary Committee to discuss a change of placement.

*Gallatin High School believes that the educational process cannot be disrupted by negative behavior. The school is for all students. The school encourages the development of a positive atmosphere where learning can take place. The GHS administration reserves the right to review each individual situation before determining whether any disciplinary action is required. **HELP US PROVIDE OUR SCHOOL WITH THE BEST POSSIBLE ATMOSPHERE FOR LEARNING TO TAKE PLACE.***

STUDENT USE OF TOBACCO

Students shall not use or possess tobacco products in any form while on school property, attending or participating in a school-sponsored event, while on school buses to and from school, or on school buses to and from school-sponsored events. On the **1st offense** a student shall automatically be given a three-day suspension from school. On the **2nd offense** the student shall automatically be given a five-day suspension from school. On the **3rd and all subsequent offenses**, the student will be suspended from school and be required to appear before the disciplinary hearing authority.

LIGHTERS AND MATCHES

Possession of lighters or matches will result in one day of OSS. After confiscation, these items will not be returned.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG USE

Drugs and alcoholic beverages are not permitted under any condition. This policy covers any school sponsored or school related activity.

ALCOHOL - Possession or use of alcoholic beverages on school property is illegal. Any student who unlawfully uses, possesses, sells, or otherwise furnishes alcoholic beverages while on school grounds or during an activity off school grounds related to school attendance will be referred to the school principal for administrative action.

DEFINITION OF TERMS:

1. Alcoholic beverage includes alcohol, spirits, liquor, wine, beer, and every liquid or solid containing alcohol, spirits, wine or beer, and which is fit for beverage purposes either alone or when diluted, mixed or combined with other substances.

2. Use shall mean either the drinking of alcoholic beverages or the indication by action or behavior that such beverages have been consumed.

3. Possession will mean either having alcoholic beverages on the person, or in the immediate vicinity of the person, or among the student's personal possessions (locker, car, etc.).

DRUGS - Any student in possession of illegal drugs or paraphernalia such as bong, pipes, lighters, rolling papers, pacifiers, etc. designed for the use of drugs or any student suspected to be

under the influence of drugs will be isolated and referred to the school principal for administrative action. The parent or guardian will be notified. All information gathered from the investigation of each incident will be made available to the police.

When determined that satisfactory evidence exists that a student used or possessed alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs at any Sumner County school-sponsored activity or used legal drugs in inappropriate amounts for other than appropriate medical purposes, the student will be suspended for up to ten days. Ten-day suspensions also include a referral to the Disciplinary Hearing Authority at the Board of Education.

WEAPONS OR DANGEROUS OBJECTS ON SCHOOL PROPERTY

Possession of a pistol, gun or firearm on school property is a felony. The Sumner County Board of Education follows a Zero Tolerance Policy concerning students who are found in possession of a weapon or dangerous instrument. Any student found to have brought a weapon to school or is found in possession of a weapon on school property will be immediately removed from the general student population and referred to the disciplinary hearing authority. The Director must report each case to the Board at its next regular meeting. When a student is determined to be a Special Education student, an M-Team meeting, which shall include the Director or his designee, will be called to determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Where appropriate, criminal charges will be brought against the student and parents or legal guardian.

The term weapon shall be defined as any dangerous instrument. The term dangerous instrument shall include but is not limited to the following:

Knives / Swords	Box cutter / Scissors	Laser pointers
Razor Blades	Clubs	Spiked wristbands
Chains	Brass knuckles	Paint ball guns
Ice pick	Taser / Electric Shock Item	Pellet / BB Gun

- Any object used in such a manner that could cause bodily harm or inflict damage to property
- Any explosive device
- Any item which could be perceived to be a dangerous instrument such as a toy or non-working device

Toy weapons or facsimiles will not be permitted on school grounds. Students who possess toy weapons or facsimiles of weapons including water guns will be suspended as determined by the principal. Depending on the circumstances, the principal may refer a student possessing a toy weapon or facsimile, including a water gun, to the disciplinary hearing authority for disposition as determined by the committee.

The principal will notify the parents or legal guardian of any student found in violation of this policy. The use of weapons and dangerous instruments in school plays, school bands, or any other school activity is prohibited unless sanctioned in advance and in writing by the Director of Schools.

Any other person in violation of this policy will be removed and appropriate criminal charges filed. This includes anyone with a legal permit from Sumner County or the State of Tennessee to carry a gun, except a person acting under authority of a governmental law enforcement agency shall be exempt.

HARRASSING / INTIMIDATION POLICY

Students caught hazing, harassing, or involved in any intimidation of another student will be dealt with accordingly. Each older student is expected to assist new and younger students in a helpful and friendly manner.

HARRASSMENT / SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Any harassment towards any student or teacher will result in stern disciplinary action. Any incident of harassment should be reported at once to one of the assistant principals. The nature of the punishment will be determined by the severity of the harassment.

DAMAGE TO PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY

Any damage or destruction of school property will result in immediate disciplinary action. In addition to the punishment, the student will be required to pay for repairing or replacing the damaged item. The Sumner County Board of Education policy states that any student who is responsible for destroying or defacing school property (books, equipment, buses, etc.) shall be held responsible for the actual cost of replacing or repairing such material or equipment.

STEALING

Anyone caught stealing will receive either in-school (ISS) or out-of-school suspension (OSS), and the offender may be turned over to Juvenile Court. Students must help us prevent stealing by **not leaving personal items unattended.**

SOLICITING OR COLLECTING MONEY AT SCHOOL

Any effort to solicit or collect money at Gallatin High School must have prior approval of the principal. An announcement will be made over the public address system to inform teachers and students of this approval. In order to protect students from unnecessary collections or “rip offs”, only major emergencies will be considered for the approval by the principal.

USE OF LIBRARY

The library is not a place to gather for socializing; a quiet atmosphere will be maintained at all times. A hall pass is mandatory for each student using the library before school and during third block. A detection system has been installed in the library to curtail the theft of books. If a student causes the alarm to be activated, intentionally or unintentionally, he or she will be assigned detention. All library books are to be returned to the book depository located at the back of the library. Computers are available for word processing. Use of the Internet is for appropriate educational research only. Students and parents are required to sign a Sumner County Schools Internet Use Permission Form. Students using the Internet are advised to follow the written procedures posted near all computers. Students who violate the procedures will be dealt with by the administration and will lose access to the Internet and/or library.

HOMEWORK POLICY

The administration and faculty of Gallatin High School believe strongly in student homework assignments. Homework is to be assigned to benefit the student and to assist teachers in their efforts to enhance the teaching and learning environment. Homework assigned during an OSS

may be completed, but credit will not be awarded. Request for homework assignments (during an extended absence) needs to be made through the front office.

TRIPS OR CONVENTION POLICY

All school or school-related trips must be approved by the principal. Prior to the trip, the student must obtain approval from each teacher and make satisfactory arrangements concerning make-up work.

TSSAA ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

All student athletes must have a passing grade the preceding year in at least six full unit subjects. Student athletes must be enrolled in at least three full unit courses each term.

CREDIT RECOVERY PROGRAM

Credit Recovery is a program that gives students the opportunity to regain a credit in a required course they have previously failed with a minimum of a *50 average*. These credits will be recovered by showing mastery of state curriculum standards in the Plato computer lab curriculum. Eligible students will be allowed to work before or after school in a supervised setting. Upon successful completion of the Plato coursework, the student will have a standard credit, no higher than a “C”, recorded on his/her transcript. STUDENT ACADEMIC HELP

We are fortunate to be able to provide help for those students who need additional assistance in subjects in which they are struggling (remediation lab). Each morning before school, teachers are available to assist students in English, world language, mathematics, science, and social studies. Students should ask their teachers for the specific times and locations for this assistance.

SUMMER READING PROGRAM

Students in standard and honors level English courses will be required to complete a summer reading assignment. Details on this program can be obtained from the school website at <http://ghs.sumnerschools.org>

OUTSTANDING DEBT

Students having an outstanding debt to the school will not receive their grades at the end of the year. Any students leaving Gallatin High School must clear their debts before final records will be sent to a new school.

OTHER

Policies outlined in this handbook pertain not only to the school day but also to all school-related functions and trips. Problems or matters not listed in this handbook will be handled in a manner that the administration and faculty deem appropriate.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

ACADEMIC TEAM consists of sophomore, junior, and senior students who compete in academic tournaments across the mid-South. Members of the teams are chosen by the GHS faculty and represent the best the school has to offer. The team members are involved in both regular practices and individual study to prepare for local, state, and regional competitions.

ART HONOR SOCIETY allows students who are serious about art to be part of a national society. Students must maintain an 'A' or 'B' average in at least twelve months of art classes. Students must pay an annual membership fee of \$3.00.

ASTRONOMY CLUB fosters activities for students interested in space exploration. An onsite observatory allows students to learn more about the universe.

CHEERLEADERS play an active role in all football and basketball games. They plan and orchestrate pep rallies. Cheerleaders are selected following a rigorous camp based on individual performance during try-outs.

DANCE TEAM members perform before all home football games and during half time of both girls and boys basketball games. Selection is based on individual performance during tryouts.

DECA develops student leaders in marketing, management, and entrepreneurship. The distributive education club provides competitive opportunities for students enrolled in marketing.

FUTURE BUSINESS LEADERS OF AMERICA is for business and office education students in grades nine through twelve. The purpose of FBLA is to provide opportunities for students to develop vocational/career competencies, civic responsibilities, and positive self-concept. FBLA participates in state and national competitions. Dues are \$10.

FELLOWSHIP OF CHRISTIAN ATHLETES' purpose is "to present to athletes and coaches, and all whom they influence, the challenge and adventure of receiving Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, serving Him in their relationships and in the fellowship of the church."

FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA is devoted to improving the quality of agricultural education, increasing student interest in agriculture and providing recognition through career development events. Some examples of these events are nursery and landscaping, horse judging, speaking contests, and skills contest just to name a few. FFA is structured on three levels-local, state, and national. In order to be a member, a student must first enroll in an agricultural class.

FAMILY, CAREER, & COMMUNITY LEADER OF AMERICA is available to students who have been enrolled or are currently enrolled in a Family & Consumer Science class. FCCLA includes projects, programs, meetings, and contests pertaining to Family & Consumer Science subjects. Dues are \$15.

INTERACT, sponsored by the Gallatin Noon Rotary Club, aids the Rotary Club with fund raising and charity events involving organizations such as Gallatin Daycare, Vanderbilt Children's Hospital and Habitat for Humanity. Students are also invited as guests to the Rotary Club Luncheons.

KEY CLUB is an international student-led service organization which performs a variety of service projects. Key Club members boast a spirit of volunteerism which is seen at local elementary schools, football games, and other community activities.

MATH TEAMS are comprised of students from Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, Pre-Calculus, and Calculus. The primary goal of the team is to prepare for the mathematics competitions held at Volunteer State Community College in early April. Anyone who enjoys mathematics is welcome to try out for the team.

MOCK TRIAL offers students with an interest in the legal field the opportunity to participate in an actual case. Students role play attorneys, witnesses, etc. and compete to perform well enough to move to the district level and on to the state. Local attorneys work with the students to prepare them for competition.

MODEL UN seeks to help students understand the operation s of the United Nations. Students form delegations representing interests of a member country in the General Assembly. The delegations draft and debate a wide range of resolutions. Some students participate on the Security Council, the Model International Court of Justice, or the Press Corps. The conference is held in Nashville in the fall.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY is based on scholarship, leadership, service, and character. Juniors and seniors who have exhibited these qualities, and have a 4.0 grade point average will be considered for membership. To join, members must pay a \$20 fee; to renew membership, students pay a \$5 fee. NHS is a service club so members are required to participate in service activities each year.

NOAH'S PROMISE is a countywide program aimed at reducing/preventing alcohol use by high school students. By working with the community and its business leaders, leaders hope to share information about the effects of underage drinking and to make it more difficult for those under 21 to obtain alcohol

SPANISH CLUB promises a tradition of food, fun and foreign language. Special occasions such as Cinco de Mayo are celebrated and incorporate music, costume and culture.

STUDENT COUNCIL is an organization, which serves the GHS student body and faculty. Members provide leadership and act as role models. The GHS student council organizes football and basketball homecomings as well as countless other school and community service projects. The council consists of five officers and twenty representatives. Five reps from each class are elected by popular vote. Requirements for membership include completion of an application and a minimum 2.5 GPA.

SKILLS USA welcomes any student enrolled in a vocational class. Dues are \$7.50. VICA helps to develop leadership skills and maintain a positive attitude for leadership abilities through participation in educational, vocational, civic, social, and recreational activities. Contests for selected participating students of their vocational field are held on local, regional, state, national, and international levels.

TRI-HI-Y is an organization for young women that promotes Christian ideals. The purpose of Tri-Hi-Y is “to create, maintain, and extend throughout the home, school, and community high standards of Christian character.” The club is active in a variety of community service projects.

YEARBOOK staff members apply to be part of a special team that creates a comprehensive, year-round annual. Students interested in graphics, photography, writing and editing are encouraged to participate.

YOUTH LEGISLATURE allows students to write bills that, if passed, are signed by the Governor. The conference in Nashville is held annually in the spring. Prior to the conference students prepare their bills through extensive research.
